2005 Annual Report



From the Chief's Desk ...

Our 2004 successes generated hundreds of hours of work and set the stage for continued success in 2005.

Passage of the Bond measure in November 2004 set the wheels in motion for 2005 to be a year consumed by committee meetings, consultations, apparatus inspections, department and manufacturers visits, and creating specification details. Although we had identified the general apparatus needs of the District before the bond, defining the details of that equipment, identifying the manufacturer, negotiating price, and awarding the bid generated hundreds and hundreds of hours of work for Volunteers and Staff alike.

As you may remember the District received a FIRE ACT Grant within two weeks of filing for the bond measure in 2004 so we were able to reduce the



amount of taxes levied for the bond by \$200,000. With that grant the District was able to purchase a new inventory of SCBAs (air packs) replacing our current



packs which were 15 to 20 years old and failing on a regular basis. We received the packs in January 2005; after many hours of training, preparation, and inven-

torying the packs they were placed into service in all four stations March 1st.

Committee meetings continued and in March the specs for the BRATs (Brush/Rescue Attack Trucks) were completed and ready to go out for competitive bid. The bid was advertised and only two bids were returned for consideration. After review in April the bid was awarded to Danko Emergency Equipment in Snyder, Nebraska with a completion date of December of 2005. Four firefighters were selected to go back to Snyder in

January to do the final inspection and drive them back to Stayton. That story and maybe the "Ode to the BRAT Pack" for 2006 annual report.

The committees developing the specifications for the engine and ladder completed their task in April and were ready to go to the Board for permission to announce the requests for bids. Upon receiving only one competitive bid, the bid for both the ladder and engine was awarded to Pierce Manufacturing in Appleton, Wisconsin. After several more months of committee meetings and a trip to the Pierce manufacturing plant, the order for the ladder and engine was placed with a completion date early in 2006.

Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program



The 3rd of June brought a phone call from FEMA asking the FIRE ACT Grant pre-award questions indicating that the District may receive yet another grant. On July 7th the District received a phone call from Congresswoman Hooley's office confirming that the District indeed had been awarded a second FIRE ACT Grant in as many years. This grant was for the purchase of new personal protective equipment including turnouts, helmets, gloves, boots, hoods, and flashlights. The grant also included purchasing a special dryer designed for turnouts, gloves, boots and hoods. The next several months were spent testing a variety of equipment and researching different manufacturers. In October the bids were reviewed and contracts were awarded to two different manufacturers. To date, all the equipment has been received and placed into service except for the turnouts which should be arriving sometime in April 2006.

During all of this the Volunteers and Staff continued to perform their day-to-day responsibilities; responding to calls, continuous training, on-going education and community events. It never ceases to amaze me the amount of time, commitment and dedication the Volunteers have for their community. Equally important is the support and appreciation the community continues to show the Volunteers. I feel extremely fortunate to be a part of this team and to serve with, and for, the quality of individuals we have in Stayton Fire District.

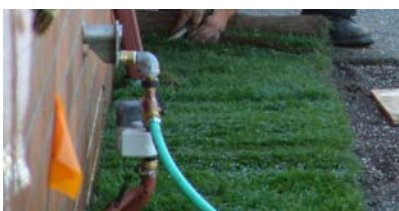

Facilities

grants

In 2005 the District applied for the Federal Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) for turnout gear and a turnout dryer. The District was awarded \$112,175 to purchase 50 complete sets of turnouts and the dryer.

The District also applied for an amendment to our 2004 AFG and was awarded \$16,767 remaining funds to place 2,425 reflective address signs in the rural areas of the District. In addition, Santiam Memorial Hospital donated \$1,000, the Stayton Volunteer Protection Company #1 donated \$1,500 and the District provided \$1,865 to complete the project.

The EMT Education Fund awarded \$4,585 to send four of our

firefighters to Chemeketa Community College for their EMT Basic certification and one firefighter for his EMT Intermediate certification training. In addition, the District provided First Responder training to eight new firefighters.

The District also received \$3,600 from the 2003 Rural Access to Emergency Devices grant to purchase two new AED's that were originally purchased from this grant and recalled.

Overall, 2005 was a very good year for grants. The District and our constituents will benefit tremendously from the grant funds awarded.

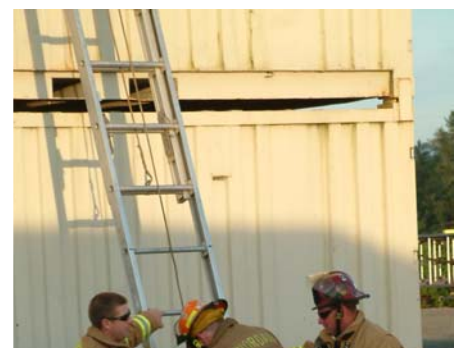

Wow, what a year! In my 20 years with the District I can't remember a more exciting time for the Volunteers. We spent many hours working with new equipment and writing specifications for new apparatus. This is above and beyond responding to 843 calls and 52 weekly drills.

With the purchase of new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA), used for breathing while in hazardous atmospheres, along came many drills and hours on how to use them. The SCBA's are a vital component to a firefighter, providing clean air to breath so they are able to save lives and protect property from smoke and fire. Each and every firefighter has to be proficient in the use and operations of the SCBA's in order to perform their duties automatically and effectively.

The timing of the new SCBA's came perfect with the acquisition of the old Paris Woolen Mill store to use for training and eventually to burn for practice. Many drill nights and weekend classes utilized the building for not only Stayton firefighters, but also Aumsville, Sublimity, Scio, Lyons and members of the

Santiam Firefighter Recruit Academy. The focus of the training with this building was search and rescue and SCBA confidence for the firefighter. Eventually the training ended with the burning of the building and practice of firefighting skills.

Stayton Fire District is involved with the Santiam Firefighter Recruit Academy, a cooperative effort of the Turner, Jefferson, Aumsville, Scio, Sublimity, Lyons, Gates and Stayton Fire District's to train new members on basic firefighting skills. Two academies a year are offered in the area to train new Volunteers on how to respond to emergencies in the communities they serve. The time commitment for a new Volunteer member to receive this training is approximately 150 hours.

Volunteer and career members of the Stayton Fire District train to respond to a multitude of incidents, emergency and non-emergency. This training is primarily accomplished during weekly drills that are held every Thursday night for 2 hours. Additional training can be obtained from weekend classes, conferences, workshops and seminars. The members of the Stayton Fire District take training very seriously, like our motto "*Volunteer Service With Pride*".

Civil Service

Early in 2005, staff member, Riley Martinka, decided to make a career move and was hired on with Eugene Fire District as a full-time firefighter. Chief Carriger then had to decide how we were going to provide the daytime response we needed. It was decided that Maintenance Officer Smith would go back to paid firefighter status and the District would hire another FF/EMT to take Riley's place.

Oregon law states that if we employ four or more firefight-

ers on a full-time basis, we are required to implement the civil service system. In a nutshell, its a set of rules that ensures that all hiring, firing, promoting, and demoting is done in a fair and unbiased manner and that all qualified candidates are provided an equal employment opportunity.

The District Board of Directors appointed three citizens who were willing to serve as commissioners: Jack Fiske, Don Eubank, and Randy Lafollett. Chief Roy Hari, of Marion County Fire District #1, was appointed as the Chief Examiner who administers examinations and other aspects of the Civil Service program.

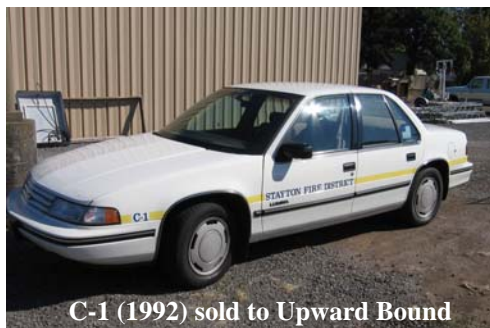

Apparatus

A 2005 Ford Expedition and 2005 Ford F250 pickup were the first vehicles purchased from the November 2004 bond levy proceeds. The Expedition serves as the new Command vehicle and the pickup serves as a Support vehicle for transporting personnel and equipment. With the new vehicles going in-service, older ones were moved to positions where they would be put to the best use. The old command vehicle (1995 Suburban) is now serving in a support role.

In December, an ad was placed in the newspaper to advertise the sale of our older surplus vehicles. All have sold except for an engine and mini pumper. The funds from the sale of vehicles were used towards equipping new apparatus.

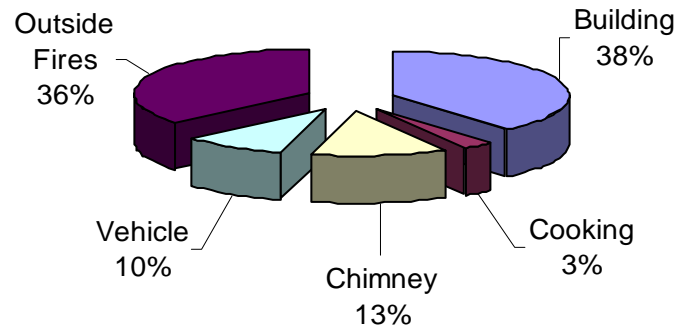

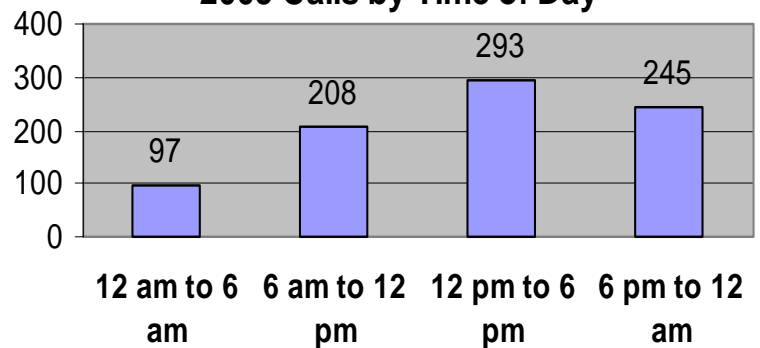

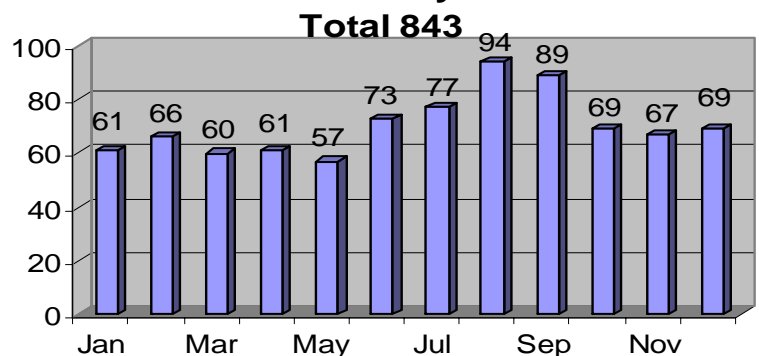
2005 Fire Calls by Type Excluding Mutual Aid



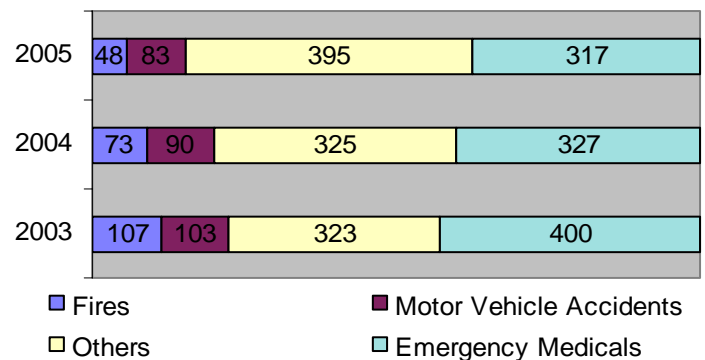
2005 Calls by Time of Day

The Elkhorn Volunteers hosted a community potluck, a Volunteer Business meeting and their annual dinner for the Board of Directors. Stayton Station (A year in the life of a Station 80 Volunteer)

Show up for drill, show up for calls, be professional and magically make all the bad go away when you arrive on scene. That's it right? WRONG! That is just a small part of being a Volunteer. Our hidden talents and extra effort are used much more frequently. Skills like cooking, golfing, giving kids candy and gifts, cruising cars, designing apparatus, and, of course, great organizational skills to make it all come together.

At the breakfast in May we fed 920 people and raised \$2000. The Annual Firefighters Golf Tournament sported 33 teams and raised a record \$5000 to benefit the Oregon Burn Center in Portland. July has us parading on the 4th, cooking for Habitat for Humanity's fundraiser, and painting faces and handing out fire prevention materials at Summerfest. In October we host the Public Safety Open House for a safe, educational night of fun and treats for hundreds of kids and their parents. During the Christmas season we host the Santa Cruise In and Toys for Joy program which allows us to help provide a little extra Christmas joy to local children. This year we were able to give gifts to 384 kids.

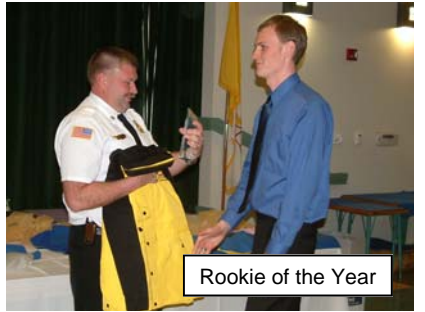
